BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MEETING MINUTES FROM September 16, 2025

CALL TO ORDER

Board Chair Deborah Stinson called the meeting to order at 3:00 PM at St 6 and virtually via "Zoom", call in number 1 (253) 205-0468, Meeting ID 87867559242.

COMMISSIONERS & ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

District 1 Commissioners: Deborah Stinson, Geoff Masci, Ed Davis, Dave Seabrook, Gene Carmody and Steve Craig.

Admin Staff: Deputy Chief Brummel, HR Manager Stewart, MSO Ridgway, CRM Wittenberg, Finance Manager Roy Lirio and District Secretary Cray.

1. AGENDA CHANGES – The HR presentation will be bumped until HR Manager Stewart is able to log in virtually. Item D added to New Business to Consider the Stryker Contract Addition.

2. CONSENT AGENDA

• Approve Minutes from August 19, 2025, Regular Board Meeting.

- Approve General Fire expenditure warrants dated August 26, 2025, August 28, 2025, and September 5, 2025, totaling \$163,780.36
- Approve EMS expenditure warrants dated August 26, 2025, August 28, 2025, and September 5, 2025, totaling \$44,147.90
- Approve payroll expenditure warrants dated August 18, 2025, September 4, 2025, totaling \$874,721.83.

MOTION: Masci moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Seabrook seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

- **3. LIST OF CORRESPONDENCE** No correspondence received this month.
- **4. PUBLIC COMMENT** No public comment given.
- **5. PRESENTATIONS** Moved to follow Old Business.
- **6. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS/ANNOUNCEMENTS** The Board reviewed items in the media spotlight.
- 7. STAFF REPORTS Brummel gave the Board a summary of his trip to the National Fire Academy. The class chose EJFR's Marine program to use as the class project. They focused on staffing and what it would take for a more robust response.

Wittenberg noted that we are hosting a weeklong Child Passenger Safety course next week at Station 6. Erin Murray is attending that following her return from Spokane for the Youth Fire Setting Investigator course.

Lirio gave a brief update on the 2026 budget development. We are two meetings in and have \$1.5million in requests to review. The process this year is more streamlined and is adding value to our meetings.

MSO Ridgway announced Jesse Cordova was able to get into the Medic One PM training program at the very last minute from the waitlist. Staff were able to get his apartment lined up in under a week. He just completed his first week.

Complete staff reports are included in the board packet.

8. COMMITTEE/WORKGROUP REPORTS

- **A.** *Budget Committee* No report, did not meet.
- **B.** *Data Group* No report, did not meet.
- C. Community Risk Reduction Group None report.
- **D.** Apparatus Committee BC Fletcher reported the new brush unit is now in service. The remounted ambulance is expected in October. We have a new project manager for Braun Northwest, and he is doing well. The new CARES rig will be ready on Monday. The old CARES rig is now a utility/backup. We did lose a tender that is beyond repair.
- *E. Facilities Committee* did not meet.
- **9. JeffCom Report** CAD upgrade likely coming in October.
- 10. LOCAL 2032 REPORT None.
- **11. PUBLIC COMMENT Agenda items only None.**

12. OLD BUSINESS

A. Levy Lid Lift Discussion – Stinson stated that two decisions need to be made: the levy rate to ask for as well as which election to run the lid lift in. Lirio gave an overview of possible levy rate scenarios. He discussed the 1% cap on revenue and current inflation rates causing costs to rise at a higher rate than revenues resulting in a degrading fund balance.

The board discussed several different scenarios and noted that we must set a rate that will allow for enough revenue to be generated to keep us from having to go back out for a lid lift for three-four more years. While also keeping in mind that we don't want to ask for too much.

Seabrook asked about lid lifts that include a built in CPIU inflator. More research will need to be done on that topic. Craig suggested a levy rate in the \$1.30-\$1.40 range, any more may be hard to justify in our tough economic times. Davis would like to go to \$1.45 and if that fails, we could run it again at \$1.40. He noted that Port Ludlow has always been very supportive of the Fire District levies. Masci agreed with Davis. Stinson noted hesitation with a CPIU inflator but stated \$1.40 would be the highest she is comfortable with. **MOTION**: Masci moved to set a levy lid lift rate at \$1.40 per thousand of assessed value. Seabrook seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

The board discussed the timing of when to run the lid lift. Ther are four possible options: February, April, August and November. Cray noted that if we wait until the November election, it requires staff to create two budgets, one for each possible outcome. Discussion of election date centered on

having enough time to run it again if it fails. **MOTION:** Masci moved to run the lid-lift during the February 2026 election. Seabrook seconded them motion which passed unanimously.

HR Presentation – HR Manager Stewart gave a short presentation on merit-based salary increases. This is a metric that compares an employee's actual salary to the mid-point of the salary range for their position. This helps assess internal pay equity, performance and market competitiveness.

Administrative Policy allows for adjustments of up to 4% base salary. The Board may consider annual evaluations, EJFR's fiscal situation, fiscal impact of other strategic goals and the employees' total compensation relative to other comparable agencies in our region. If the Board were to apply this process for all administrative staff based on the highest performance appraisals, it would cost the district between \$17,805 – \$28,632 for 2026.

13. NEW BUSINESS

A. Policy/SOG Updates – The Board reviewed the following updated SOG.

SOG 5010d EMT Requirements

B. – **Resolution 25-09 Surplus of District Property**– MOTION: Masci moved to approve resolution 25-09 as presented. Craig seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

C. Resolution 25-10 – Finance Director Lirio noted the ambulance transport fees are reviewed annually and compared to our neighboring agencies. He noted the proposed rates are carefully considered to not be the highest in the area. He estimates about \$62,000 in annual revenue increases. **MOTION**: Seabrook moved to approve the new rates as presented in Resolution 25-10. Craig seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

D. DP- Consider Stryker Contract Addition and Purchases – While in our budget review process, MSO Ridgway had made a request to add 2 power cots, load systems and stair chairs to standardize our ambulances. Along with this she also requested the CO upgrade and LifePak 35 modems for the existing 8 ambulances already under our Stryker Lease. There is a 5% cost savings if we agree to purchase these items by October 1st. The actual purchase would occur in 2026. Craig noted that these gurney systems are the single most important piece of equipment we use. Consistency across the fleet is a safety component. Masci moved to approve the request to purchase the items with the 5% savings. Craig seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

14. UPCOMING TOPICS/EVENTS -

GOOD OF THE ORDER – Brummel thanked everyone for their flexibility and problem solving while he was covering for Chief Black's vacation. He added that he has been investigating a new data analytics program, Dark Horse. We would be able to capitalize on a lower rate by tagging on with the Kitsap agencies who all use it. More to come in the near future.

Stinson adjourned the meeting at 4:39pm.

I had a gas leak at my house in the workshop today and I called 911 to get it checked out and the gas shut off. I want to call your attention to the quick response from the fire fighters including Aaron Parker and BC Justin Fletcher. They shut the gas off at the workshop shut-offs and at the main tank. They donned respiratory equipment and checked for the leak and there was enough gas collected in the workshop to set the alarms off. They opened the building to air it out and used a fan to remove some of the gases and stayed until the gases had dissipated. I contacted a local propane service company and will be arranging with them to have the system and the heaters safety checked and repaired as needed. Everyone did a great job and I commend their professionalism. Thank you.

- Marine 1 supported rescue and salvage operations for several vessels in Port Townsend.
- Propane related emergency in a basement. Firefighters donned protective gear, monitored the air and ventilated.

EJFR received and declined two mutual aid requests for State Mobilization. Weekly availability rosters continue.

Fire Chief General Activities

FC was approached by the BOCC to participate in Jefferson County's first <u>Fire Prevention</u> <u>Summit</u>. The meeting would include all fire districts and serve as a special BOCC meeting at the Chimacum Fire Station. Minutes can be found on Jefferson County's website. Budget

Separately the FC met with JC Forester for a strategy meeting, joined by County Manager, BOCC Chair and other JC chiefs. Jefferson County was noticed our application for the **Community Wildfire Defense Grant** (CWDG) for \$3,000,000+ was denied.

Other Projects

- EVALS Annual performance appraisals for staff and day shift have begun and should be completed by mid-October.
- Budget development for 2026 is nearing completion.
- WSRB Update The new W protection classes included both the rules for establishing the W Protection Classes and advisory factors for each of the new Protection Classes. While the State Office of Insurance Commissioner (OIC) has approved the rules, they are requesting additional data and analysis to support the factors. The WFC-WSRB subcommittee is continuing to work on other issues, such as the 6 firefighters per fire station scoring metric.
- NERIS integration is underway.
- Agency Resilience Propane vendor contracts are being reviewed to establish more reliable billing and availability. Starlink is being installed at two EJFR facilities and is currently being programmed as an alternate network resource. Seismic reinforcement of the North Building at Station 5 is underway.

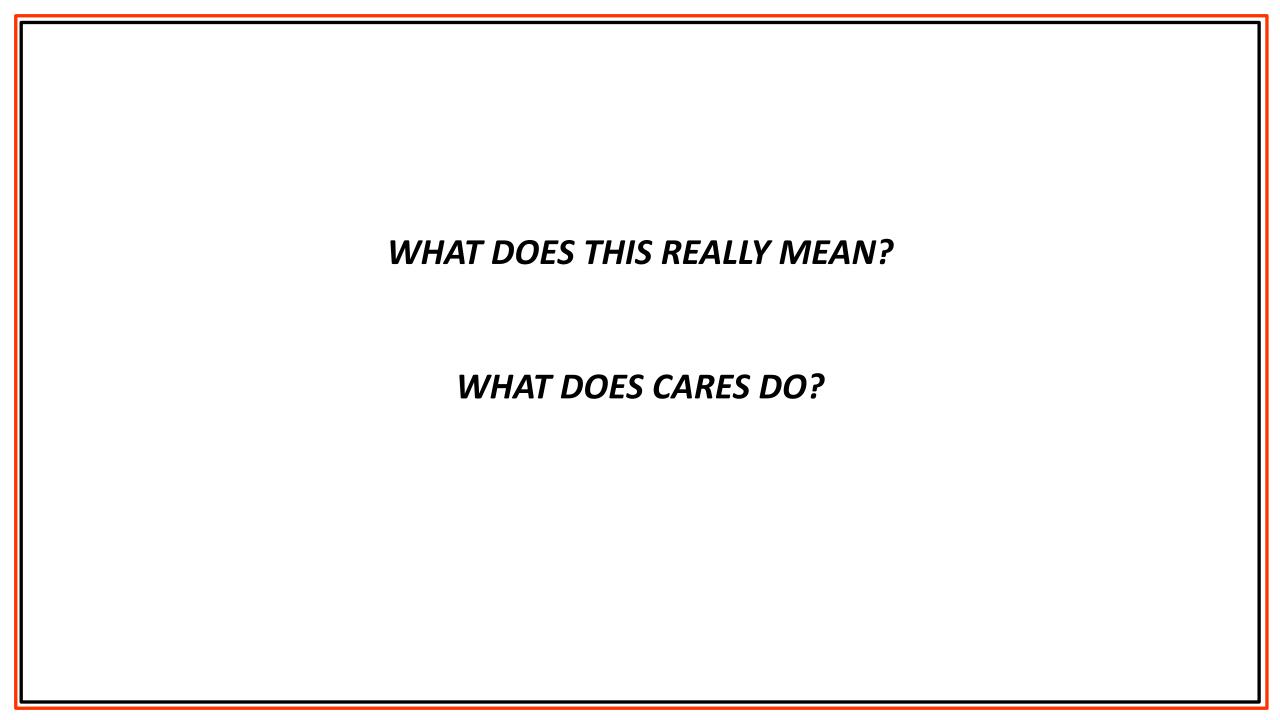

CARES has significantly expanded access to services for vulnerable individuals within East Jefferson County.

Through effective outreach and collaboration with community partners, the utilization of available resources and services has led to improved service uptake.

CARES has reduced barriers to access, particularly for those who may struggle with navigating complex systems.

CARES case management services help streamline processes and ensure individuals receive the timely support they need.

Daily Routine?

CARES will visit the shelter to help a client complete Medicare application and access the foodbank.

CARES is checking in on an elderly client, confirming her doctor updated her prescriptions. They will pick them up and deliver if needed.

At the scene of an overdose and subsequent CPR, CARES will assist in the CPR and initiate mental health interventions for the family.

CARES will pick up a walker from ECHHO and deliver it to a client that is homebound post-surgery.

CARES will visit an unhoused client living in the forest, bringing them food, clothing, compassion and *REFERRALS!*

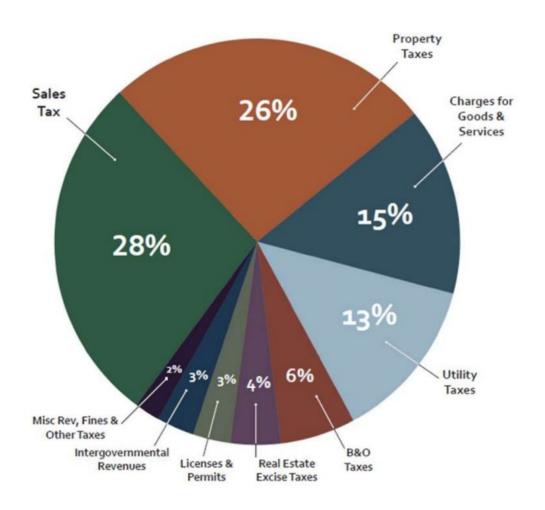




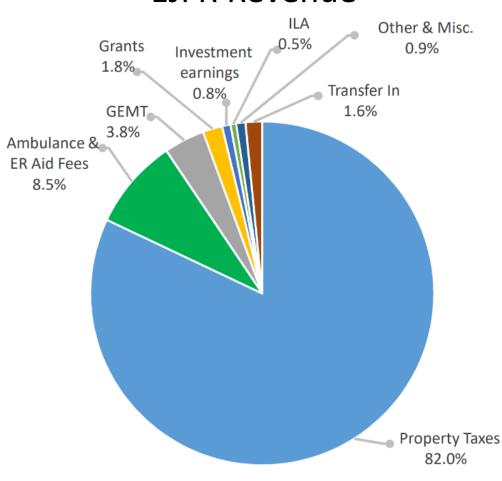

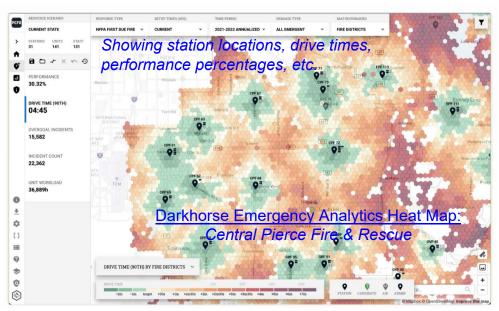
Objective 2.3: Leverage Data Analytics for Decision Making

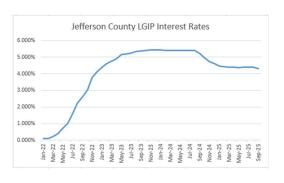

Financial Highlights:

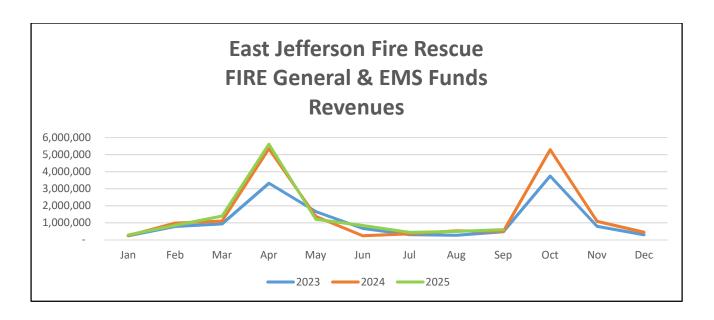
• While the 2025 Adopted Budget includes a total projected deficit of \$1.1 million across the Fire and EMS funds, the District has historically taken a conservative approach to budgeting. Current preliminary estimates are consistent with this trend, indicating that actual results will likely generate favorable variances, which will instead add to the total fund balances. More definitive estimates will be available for the November 2025 Board of Commissioners meeting.

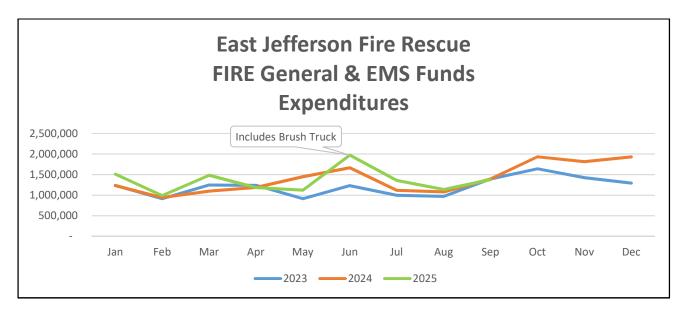


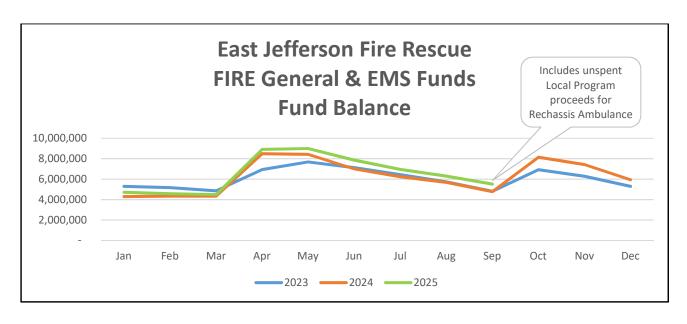
- Personnel Expenditures: Expenditures for Salaries, Overtime, and Benefits are tracking as expected and consistent with prior trends.
- Investment earnings: The LGIP gross interest rate was **4.2918%** in August 2025, representing **92.4%** of the District's Fund Balance (as of 9/30/25).
- 2026 Budget Development Update: With sincere thanks and appreciation for the Budget Committee's
 diligent work, the committee has completed its thorough review and prioritization of all requests,
 resulting in the Recommended 2026 Budget now before the Board of Commissioners. The subsequent
 Board workshop and required public hearing are being scheduled.
- Medicare Transport Fee Update: The 22.6% Super-Rural Medicare add-on for transport fee revenue expired
 on September 30, 2025. With Congressional action currently pending due to the shutdown, we are actively
 monitoring for news regarding the reestablishment of this funding. Taking a conservative approach in the 2026
 budget, the forecast for transport fee revenues was reduced by \$300,000 to account for this potential loss.

Other Highlights:

- o Submitted reimbursement documents for the ambulance re-chassis (Local Program).
- o Billed all outstanding grants (Wildland, CARES, Child Safety Passenger).
- Received new Assessed Values for Port properties, prompting a review to update the ILA contract/Fire Control fee.
- Engaged the public at Fire Fest, providing direct answers on the District's finances.

New Apparatus Updates

- Fire Engines
 - o Budgeted for \$1,142,500 each for a total of \$2,285,000
 - In May of '24 the BOC approved the final cost of purchase not to exceed \$2,430,707.00
 - After the third attempt we have received a drawing that will meet all of our needs and we feel satisfied with.
 - Overall length increase of 4"
 - Keep current wheel base
 - Increase compartment space
 - Contract has been signed with True North Emergency Equipment for \$2,107,472.00 equaling \$1,053,736.00 per engine before taxes and delivery

- expenses. Price is not final and will fluctuate based off changes during build process.
- Pre-construction meeting was completed Aug 26th-29th and the members that flew back to participate included Chief Black, BC Fletcher, LT Kauzlarich, LT Morris, FF Kinney and FF Richter.
- Due to the recent availability of the current generation of motors for the engines we have signed another change order to go with the "L9" motor vs the "X10". The horsepower and torque outputs are near identical and the savings that will be received are \$80,257.00 per engine or overall savings of \$160,514. A change order was signed on 11/8/24 confirming the price reduction.
- The new work order stated there was still an 800 day expectancy to receive our engines however, the dealer is optimistic that it will be significantly less time.
- Engine committee has completed the needs list for the new apparatus to total approximately \$225,000. This amount has been added to the '25 budget for purchase.
- While Spartan was reviewing the specs it was discovered that not all of the equipment was added in for the new radio system and a \$1,208.00 change order was signed per engine to allow proper completion.

Ambulance 4x4

- Budgeted for \$275,000
- A contract has been signed with Braun Northwest for the build of a 2025 North Star Ambulance through the HGAC buying Co-op for the purchase price of \$301,925.00.
- On 1/21 PM Wagner and myself went to Braun Northwest and conducted our prebuild meeting for the new ambulance. They advised us at the time that they currently have our ambulance slated to be completed in April of 2026.
- The final build specs were submitted to us for review and a change order was signed crediting us back \$7,550.00

Medium Duty Rescue

- Budgeted for \$250,000
- A new preliminary ballpark price provided by Braun Northwest puts the Rescue Build at \$245,000- \$255,000 before taxes
- The purchase of this vehicle has been postponed due to budgetary constraints

Ambulance Remount (EJ239)

- It was determined during budgetary conversations that we are going to rechassis one of our current ambulances.
- Remounting an ambulance means that we will be taking one of our old ambulances we currently own taking the box off of the current chassis and then putting it onto a new chassis. The box will also be receiving a makeover including new paint and replacing any parts that are worn or damaged. A remount of an ambulance saves a significant amount of money as compared to a new build and

also has a build time of only approximately 90 days after the chassis is received. This means that we should be expecting this to be completed by midyear of 2025.

- The ambulance to be remounted is EJ239 which is a 2010 E450 with approximately 200,000 miles on it. It is currently at station 5 and was moved out of the normal ambulance rotation several years ago due to its age and reliability.
- Bruan NW met with us several months ago to look over the ambulance and determine which pieces would be replaced and which pieces would remain the same.
- A proposal has been received from Braun Northwest for \$194,734.00 not including taxes. Additional costs have been added on an approved by the BOC in January's meeting to include radios, decaling, tax and any unforeseen costs incurred by Braun after tearing down the ambulance and assessing need for repairs. The total purchase price is approved at \$241,470. The proposal has been signed and returned which has started our build clock for the remount.
- New chassis agreement paperwork has been signed and submitted which will prompt Braun to order our new chassis.
- Pre-build meeting was conducted on May 21st with Fletcher, Wagner and Johnson to confirm the spec. The vehicle has been stripped of all unnecessary items and we are waiting for Braun to give us a date that they would like to receive the vehicle to begin construction.
- Our expected date to receive the vehicle back has been updated to October.
- EJ239 was delivered to Braun Northwest on 6/13 for them to begin the build process.
- The final specs were sent over for review and a change order was signed on 8/1 for an additional cost of \$1,550.00
- While tearing down and testing the oxygen system it was determined that it was leaking and that additional items would need to be replaced. An additional change order was signed for \$900.00
- Update- The vehicle was inspected by BC Fletcher and PM Wagner on 10/7 and returned to EJFR. The final purchase price from Braun NW was \$214,858.17. We are currently working on installing decals and cleaning up a few small items to put the vehicle in service which is expected to occur in late October early November.

C.A.R.E.S Vehicle (Final Report)

- The purchase of a 2024 Ford Maverick was made in July to replace the aging current vehicle with 200,000 miles on it.
- Lights have been ordered and have arrived, but we are currently still waiting on the arrival of radios so the upfitter can come in and install all of the components.
- We are attempting to standardize our logos that we use to avoid using something different on each and every new rig that arrives. With doing this we

are trying to standardize the font that is on the vehicles which has proven difficult to match what we currently have. It appears that it was not a standard font, and we are talking with design consultants to see what it would take to recreate the font that we have.

Update- The vehicle was placed in service on 9/22 and is officially completed.



Additional Awareness

- EJ034-2005 Ford F250 former investigation vehicle
 - This vehicle will be repurposed into the new utility vehicle at Station 2 replacing the former 1993 Dodge 2500(EJ710).
 - The snowplow equipment will be moved over to this vehicle off of Brush 2 (EJ395). This will occur after the wildland fire season to ensure that Brush 2 remains in service during that time.
 - The fuel tank from EJ710 will be also moved onto this vehicle.
 - The vehicle has been stripped down and the canopy has been removed placing this unit in service as a new utility truck at Station 2. The additional work on this vehicle will take place in late October as stated above.
 - Update- Vehicle is scheduled to have all of the plow equipment swapped over on the week of 10/13.
- EJ575- 1992 Simon Duplex Tender
 - This vehicle was purchase from Bainbridge Island Fire several years ago as a used apparatus to add to our tender fleet as a temporary fix until we were able to afford new tender.
 - It was a very custom built apparatus and there was only one other one built like it which NKFR bought at the same time that we did. They have since recently sold there's.
 - During a wildland response to Brinnon in July the tender overheated and NKFR
 was unable to assess the damage to the vehicle for several weeks due to other
 items that needed servicing. When the vehicle was finally assessed it is assumed
 that the motor has a crack in the cylinder liner and/or the valve head. Without

- tearing down the entire motor we are unable to fully diagnose the problems but because there is coolant coming out of the air box of the motor it is safe to assume it would require a full rebuild to be operable again.
- Calls have been made to several service centers in the area and each one of them said that they would not rebuild the motor due to its age, complexity of repairs and inability to acquire replacement parts. This leaves us with a tender that is inoperable.
- Conversations are being had with all the Chiefs to determine the next best course of action for a short-term and a long-term replacement solution.
- WSRB is being consulted as well to determine what our required need for tenders is to see if we can purchase something more basic without reducing our rating.

Engine and Tender Movement

- Due to the catastrophic failure of the tender as stated above some apparatus repositioning has occurred to best provide operational readiness.
- After several emails with WSRB it has been determined that we need a total of seven in service fire engines at any given time with one additional fire engine as a reserve.
- As an orginization we have identified that we should have a minimum number of four tenders in service at any given time.
- Station 8 has been operating out of a tender that is also qualified as an engine for at least a decade. The benefit of this is that they have a large water capacity however it only seats two members, it has limited compartment space, and it is significantly larger than a typical fire engine creating access issues. Another downside of having this tender at a staffed station is that typically when the vehicle is needed for water supply the crew is needed for firefighting activates which leaves the apparatus idle on a fire scene with no operator to be able to shuttle water with the vehicle.
- After conversations with all of the chiefs and members of the apparatus committee it was decided that it would be in the organizations best interest if we moved our current back up engine to become the new Engine 8 and that the current Engine 8 would become the new Tender 6. This would return our tender number to four.
- With this comes its own set of challenges meaning that we no longer have our typical back up engine to move into when an engine goes out of service. The solution that was created is that when a staffed engine has to go out of service for any reason the engine from Station 1 will be pulled from Station 1 and put in place of the out of service engine. When this occurs the crews from Station 1 would predominantly respond out of Ladder 1 because it has the capabilities to be a ladder and an engine.

- The exception to this would be that if Engine 8 goes out of service. When this
 occurs Station 8 would have to swap back into a tender because the engine from
 Station 1 will not fit in Station 8.
- The last challenge with this movement is that Station 1 regularly backs up Station 2 in their area which causes access problems for Ladder 1. The solution is that if Engine 1 gets moved out of Station 1 one of our reserve engines would move to Station 1 for this specific scenario.
- With all of this movement we still meet the WSRB requirements of seven in service engines and retain one reserve engine.
- The movement of apparatus was made on 9/27

Projects:

- **CAD upgrade** is underway after being delayed several months because Tyler would not schedule our desired annual spring upgrade. We are moving from version 2023.2 to version 2025.1, which includes a major and overdue upgrade of the GIS back end that provides address verification, mapping, quadrants, etc. The test side was upgraded last week, and the production site is scheduled to be updated November 3 (with a lengthy and total CAD outage required).
- **Fire Primary simulcast system** imbalance in audio levels was corrected by contracted technician last Tuesday. Technicians then completed annual preventative maintenance on all sites in the simulcast system and West End repeater with no major issues identified.
- Law Primary interference has been minimal lately with no progress toward tracking it down.
- IT continues to work on **extending our IP network to tower sites** over our microwave system and cellular/satellite backup. Capital funding is proposed in the 2026 draft budget to complete it, making it possible to deploy the proposed simulcast system refresh early in 2027.
- ESINet connections for 911 calls remain more vulnerable to fiber outages than
 our own connections, and the proposed tertiary use of Starlink is still pending.
 Our own network failed over to Starlink this week due to an extended earlymorning PUD maintenance outage, and IT has made some adjustments to
 network traffic that is allowed to use the Starlink connection to ensure that
 connection is more reliable when we fail over to it.
- Jeffcom and Pencom continue jointly investigating cloud-based call-handling and cloud-based CAD systems in hopes of replacing onsite equipment with a hosted solutions. We will need before the end of 2026 to determine whether we are going to replace expensive in-house call-handling equipment and CAD-hosting servers or will shift to cloud-based options for one or both. Agencies including users of CAD, LERMS and Corrections will need to participate in efforts to switch CAD systems.

Tower leasing: IT staff continue discussing our towers with additional tenants
where we have space for leased equipment, and we expect to lease space to
NOAA for a weather radio transmitter. NOAA's desire for a fixed long-term lease
is causing some issues to be resolved because of Jeffcom's lease from WA DNR is
not of similar terms.

- Strategic plan: Statewide E911 strategic plan will be reviewed and perhaps
 adopted at statewide conference in October and will provide a significant source
 of guidance for our own plan, particularly regarding future interagency
 technology deployment but also in areas of staff health and wellness and career
 development. An overview reviewed at the statewide meeting this month
 showed it to be well on track, addressing each of the areas listed above and
 nearing completion.
- Jeffcom and Pencom with the assistance of the medical program directors and EMS personnel from both counties have started the process of **updating emergency medical dispatching** guidebooks. We are jointly switching from a now unsupported guidebook from King County EMS to a fully supported program from APCO. Startup expenses include retraining all communications staff at both centers (\$100 per CO for classes taught at Pencom, \$300 for a center manager to oversee the program, \$1200 to certify instructors at Pencom) and printing customized guidecard books (\$2000). Benefits will include freshly updated guidance that matches field EMS protocols, refresher training on EMD for all communications staff and ongoing training and recertification through APCO. Future training for new COs will likely be done online through APCO classes that start every week and run for six weeks, a correction for the vexing issue we currently face of not being able to send new employees to training.

Budgetary Items:

- State equipment grant application period has opened, and we expect to apply for funding to replace CAD computers and monitors in 2026, to replace network switches and firewalls in 2026 and to replace our server cluster in 2027. Whether the server will be like-for-like or scaled down will depend on our decision regarding moving to a cloud-native CAD. The grant period covers the state's 2025-27 biennium.
- Current staffing has dropped to nine full-time, fully trained communications staff including one supervisor, three part-time communications officers filling some shifts. Scheduling is returning to normal in October after being disrupted by administrative leave for the employee who is resigning, though we will no longer have a fully trained CO working the 1000-2000 shift for the back half of the week.
- **Recruiting**: Communications officer trainee that started July 13 continues to progress through training. A second applicant has will start next week on the

- opposite half of the week. These are communications positions ten and eleven. Position twelve will be filled only once others are through training.
- **CBA** negotiations will continue at least through October given the current schedule and assumptions regarding meetings and counter proposals.
- CAD maintenance credit statement has been provided by Tyler and largely aligns
 with our records. A portion of it will be transferred to the account of the City of
 Port Angeles to cover Jeffcom's third of shared-cost items for the core CAD
 system, for which Jeffcom is no longer invoiced directly by Tyler. The remainder
 will be applied to Jeffcom's pending 2025 invoices from Tyler. Discussion
 continues with Pencom about the extent of those shared-cost items.

Health, Safety and Quality of Life:

- August communications-staff overtime remained high at 308 hours among nine fulltime communications staff not on leave (July's was 352, June's 254, May's 210).
- **Found Therapy** Services continued sit-in appointments with all shifts, and we offered staff slots at EJFR's second of two scheduled days of private, off-site wellness appointments. Staff continues to show growing trust in that relationship and have started greater making use of Found Therapy resources.
- Office relocations are in process. We will work in stages to move the finance manager out of the EOC, then director, then records specialist, then publiceducation supplies, and finally making space for a second supervisor.

***** External Relationships:

- A **User Group** meeting was held September 9.
 - ◆ Jeffcom mentioned that telephonic interpretive services for officers on scene should not be billed to Jeffcom's grant funding for 911 interpretive services, so agencies need to redistribute to instructions on using their own accounts.
 - ◆ Debriefed progress on the shift to using their table app to update unit statuses and related issue with units from all districts clearing calls entirely and resultant confusion or Jeffcom having to reactivate calls.
 - Discussed upcoming debriefing of the recent use of the Navy helicopter for a medivac.
 - ◆ Discussed records entry by Jeffcom and what additional records work can be done by staff of LE agencies.
 - Discussed upcoming project by Jeffcom and Pencom to change APCO emergency medical dispatching guidance and an invitation/request for representatives of fire agencies in both counties to help.
- Draft amendment to the MOUs with Jefferson County and City of Port Townsend for law-enforcement records services was refined and sent to JCSO to go through the county's risk/legal review. Similar process with City of Port Townsend has not been started.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MEETING MINUTES FROM September 16, 2025

CALL TO ORDER

Board Chair Deborah Stinson called the meeting to order at 3:00 PM at St 6 and virtually via "Zoom", call in number 1 (253) 205-0468, Meeting ID 87867559242.

COMMISSIONERS & ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

District 1 Commissioners: Deborah Stinson, Geoff Masci, Ed Davis, Dave Seabrook, Gene Carmody and Steve Craig.

Admin Staff: Deputy Chief Brummel, HR Manager Stewart, MSO Ridgway, CRM Wittenberg, Finance Manager Roy Lirio and District Secretary Cray.

1. AGENDA CHANGES – The HR presentation will be bumped until HR Manager Stewart is able to log in virtually. Item D added to New Business to Consider the Stryker Contract Addition.

2. CONSENT AGENDA

• Approve Minutes from August 19, 2025, Regular Board Meeting.

VOUCHERS

- Approve General Fire expenditure warrants dated August 26, 2025, August 28, 2025, and September 5, 2025, totaling \$163,780.36
- Approve EMS expenditure warrants dated August 26, 2025, August 28, 2025, and September 5, 2025, totaling \$44,147.90
- Approve payroll expenditure warrants dated August 18, 2025, September 4, 2025, totaling \$874,721.83.

MOTION: Masci moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Seabrook seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

- **3. LIST OF CORRESPONDENCE** No correspondence received this month.
- **4. PUBLIC COMMENT** No public comment given.
- **5. PRESENTATIONS** Moved to follow Old Business.
- **6. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS/ANNOUNCEMENTS** The Board reviewed items in the media spotlight.
- 7. STAFF REPORTS Brummel gave the Board a summary of his trip to the National Fire Academy. The class chose EJFR's Marine program to use as the class project. They focused on staffing and what it would take for a more robust response.

Wittenberg noted that we are hosting a weeklong Child Passenger Safety course next week at Station 6. Erin Murray is attending that following her return from Spokane for the Youth Fire Setting Investigator course.

Lirio gave a brief update on the 2026 budget development. We are two meetings in and have \$1.5million in requests to review. The process this year is more streamlined and is adding value to our meetings.

MSO Ridgway announced Jesse Cordova was able to get into the Medic One PM training program at the very last minute from the waitlist. Staff were able to get his apartment lined up in under a week. He just completed his first week.

Complete staff reports are included in the board packet.

8. COMMITTEE/WORKGROUP REPORTS

- **A.** *Budget Committee* No report, did not meet.
- **B.** *Data Group* No report, did not meet.
- C. Community Risk Reduction Group None report.
- **D.** Apparatus Committee BC Fletcher reported the new brush unit is now in service. The remounted ambulance is expected in October. We have a new project manager for Braun Northwest, and he is doing well. The new CARES rig will be ready on Monday. The old CARES rig is now a utility/backup. We did lose a tender that is beyond repair.
- *E. Facilities Committee* did not meet.
- **9. JeffCom Report** CAD upgrade likely coming in October.
- 10. LOCAL 2032 REPORT None.
- **11. PUBLIC COMMENT Agenda items only None.**

12. OLD BUSINESS

A. Levy Lid Lift Discussion – Stinson stated that two decisions need to be made: the levy rate to ask for as well as which election to run the lid lift in. Lirio gave an overview of possible levy rate scenarios. He discussed the 1% cap on revenue and current inflation rates causing costs to rise at a higher rate than revenues resulting in a degrading fund balance.

The board discussed several different scenarios and noted that we must set a rate that will allow for enough revenue to be generated to keep us from having to go back out for a lid lift for three-four more years. While also keeping in mind that we don't want to ask for too much.

Seabrook asked about lid lifts that include a built in CPIU inflator. More research will need to be done on that topic. Craig suggested a levy rate in the \$1.30-\$1.40 range, any more may be hard to justify in our tough economic times. Davis would like to go to \$1.45 and if that fails, we could run it again at \$1.40. He noted that Port Ludlow has always been very supportive of the Fire District levies. Masci agreed with Davis. Stinson noted hesitation with a CPIU inflator but stated \$1.40 would be the highest she is comfortable with. **MOTION**: Masci moved to set a levy lid lift rate at \$1.40 per thousand of assessed value. Seabrook seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

The board discussed the timing of when to run the lid lift. Ther are four possible options: February, April, August and November. Cray noted that if we wait until the November election, it requires staff to create two budgets, one for each possible outcome. Discussion of election date centered on

having enough time to run it again if it fails. **MOTION:** Masci moved to run the lid-lift during the February 2026 election. Seabrook seconded them motion which passed unanimously.

HR Presentation – HR Manager Stewart gave a short presentation on merit-based salary increases. This is a metric that compares an employee's actual salary to the mid-point of the salary range for their position. This helps assess internal pay equity, performance and market competitiveness.

Administrative Policy allows for adjustments of up to 4% base salary. The Board may consider annual evaluations, EJFR's fiscal situation, fiscal impact of other strategic goals and the employees' total compensation relative to other comparable agencies in our region. If the Board were to apply this process for all administrative staff based on the highest performance appraisals, it would cost the district between \$17,805 – \$28,632 for 2026.

13. NEW BUSINESS

A. Policy/SOG Updates – The Board reviewed the following updated SOG.

SOG 5010d EMT Requirements

B. – **Resolution 25-09 Surplus of District Property**– MOTION: Masci moved to approve resolution 25-09 as presented. Craig seconded the motion which carried unanimously.

C. Resolution 25-10 – Finance Director Lirio noted the ambulance transport fees are reviewed annually and compared to our neighboring agencies. He noted the proposed rates are carefully considered to not be the highest in the area. He estimates about \$62,000 in annual revenue increases. **MOTION**: Seabrook moved to approve the new rates as presented in Resolution 25-10. Craig seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

D. DP- Consider Stryker Contract Addition and Purchases – While in our budget review process, MSO Ridgway had made a request to add 2 power cots, load systems and stair chairs to standardize our ambulances. Along with this she also requested the CO upgrade and LifePak 35 modems for the existing 8 ambulances already under our Stryker Lease. There is a 5% cost savings if we agree to purchase these items by October 1st. The actual purchase would occur in 2026. Craig noted that these gurney systems are the single most important piece of equipment we use. Consistency across the fleet is a safety component. Masci moved to approve the request to purchase the items with the 5% savings. Craig seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

14. UPCOMING TOPICS/EVENTS -

GOOD OF THE ORDER – Brummel thanked everyone for their flexibility and problem solving while he was covering for Chief Black's vacation. He added that he has been investigating a new data analytics program, Dark Horse. We would be able to capitalize on a lower rate by tagging on with the Kitsap agencies who all use it. More to come in the near future.

ADJOURNMENT

Stinson adjourned the meeting at 4:39pm.

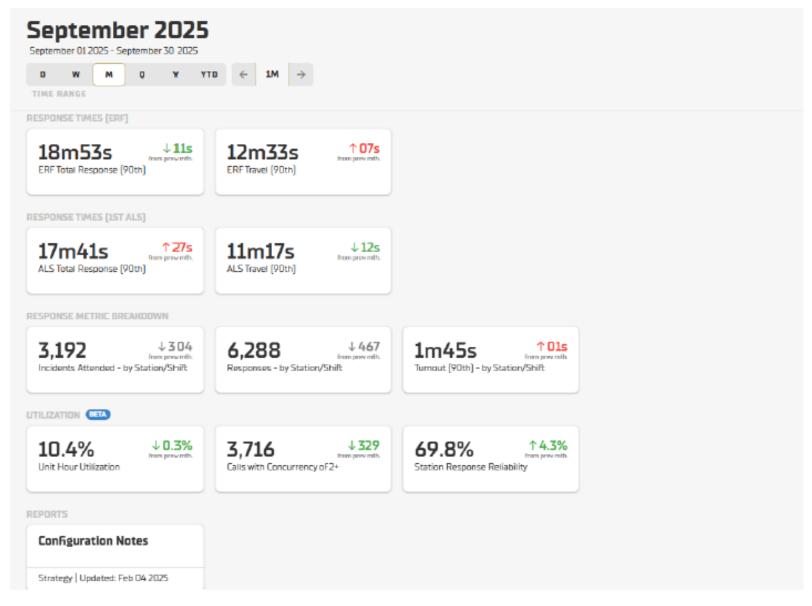
Call Volume by Year



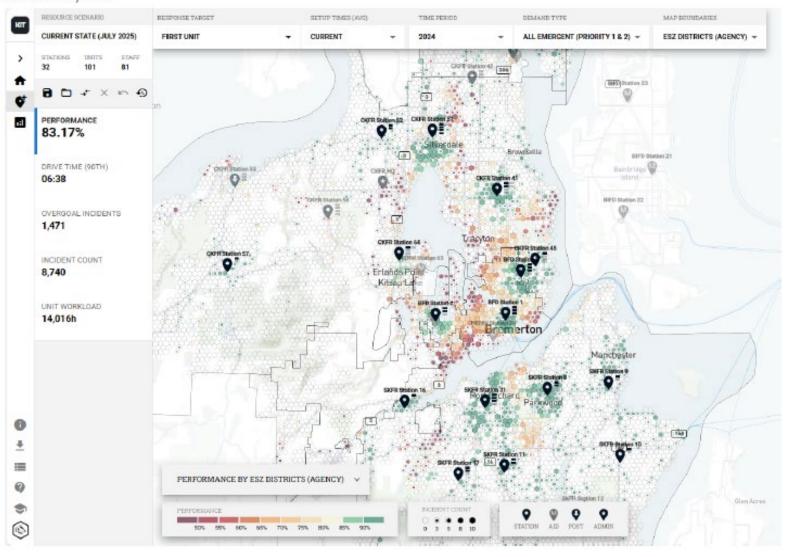

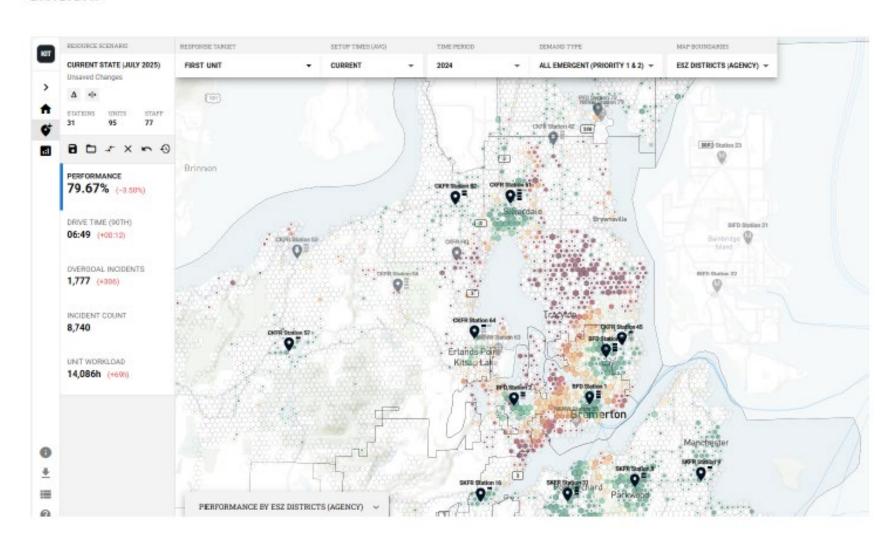

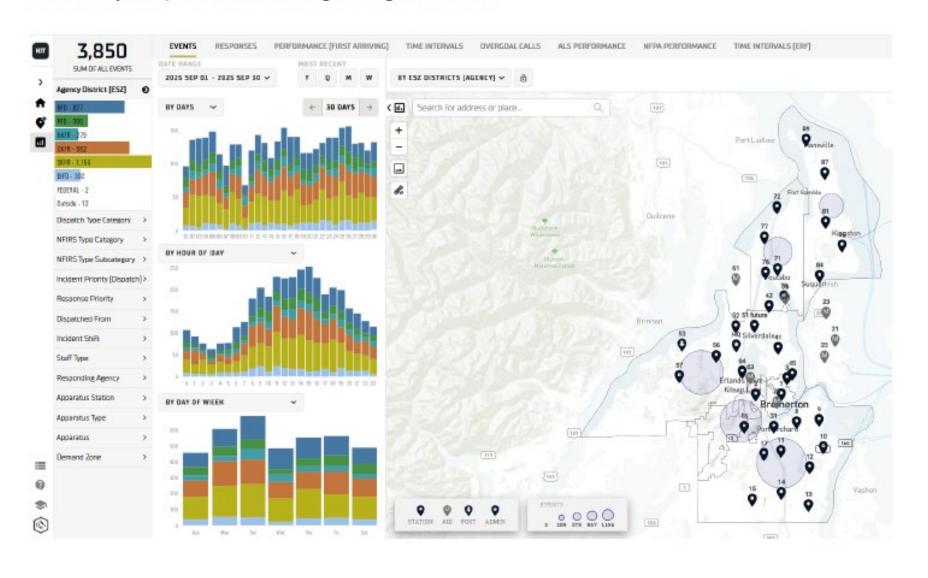

FC was approached by the BOCC to participate in Jefferson County's first <u>Fire Prevention</u> <u>Summit</u>. The meeting would include all fire districts and serve as a special BOCC meeting at the Chimacum Fire Station. Minutes can be found on Jefferson County's website. Budget

Separately the FC met with JC Forester for a strategy meeting, joined by County Manager, BOCC Chair and other JC chiefs. Jefferson County was noticed our application for the **Community Wildfire Defense Grant** (CWDG) for \$3,000,000+ was denied.

Other Projects

- EVALS Annual performance appraisals for staff and day shift have begun and should be completed by mid-October.
- Budget development for 2026 is nearing completion.
- WSRB Update The new W protection classes included both the rules for establishing the W Protection Classes and advisory factors for each of the new Protection Classes. While the State Office of Insurance Commissioner (OIC) has approved the rules, they are requesting additional data and analysis to support the factors. The WFC-WSRB subcommittee is continuing to work on other issues, such as the 6 firefighters per fire station scoring metric.
- NERIS integration is underway.
- Agency Resilience Propane vendor contracts are being reviewed to establish more reliable billing and availability. Starlink is being installed at two EJFR facilities and is currently being programmed as an alternate network resource. Seismic reinforcement of the North Building at Station 5 is underway.

Financial Highlights:

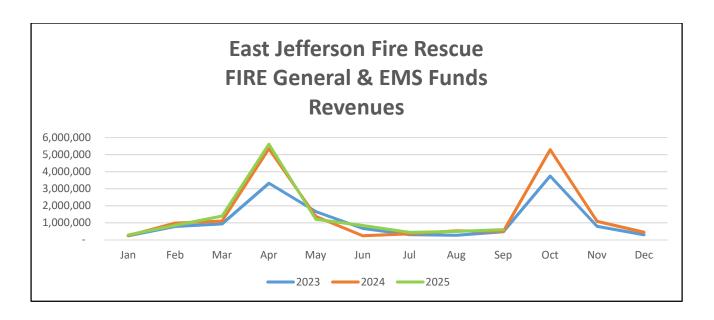
• While the 2025 Adopted Budget includes a total projected deficit of \$1.1 million across the Fire and EMS funds, the District has historically taken a conservative approach to budgeting. Current preliminary estimates are consistent with this trend, indicating that actual results will likely generate favorable variances, which will instead add to the total fund balances. More definitive estimates will be available for the November 2025 Board of Commissioners meeting.

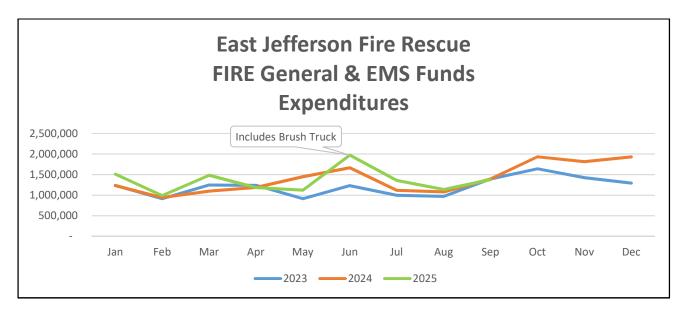


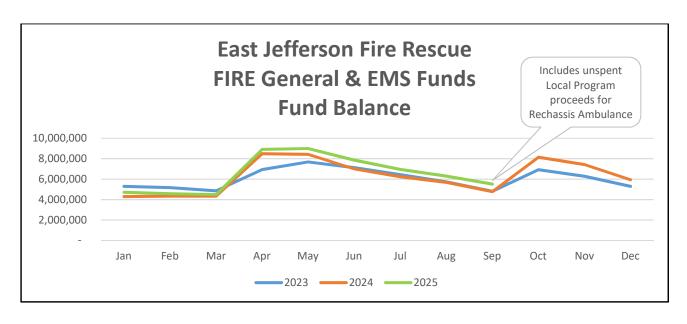
- Personnel Expenditures: Expenditures for Salaries, Overtime, and Benefits are tracking as expected and consistent with prior trends.
- Investment earnings: The LGIP gross interest rate was **4.2918%** in August 2025, representing **92.4%** of the District's Fund Balance (as of 9/30/25).
- 2026 Budget Development Update: With sincere thanks and appreciation for the Budget Committee's
 diligent work, the committee has completed its thorough review and prioritization of all requests,
 resulting in the Recommended 2026 Budget now before the Board of Commissioners. The subsequent
 Board workshop and required public hearing are being scheduled.
- Medicare Transport Fee Update: The 22.6% Super-Rural Medicare add-on for transport fee revenue expired
 on September 30, 2025. With Congressional action currently pending due to the shutdown, we are actively
 monitoring for news regarding the reestablishment of this funding. Taking a conservative approach in the 2026
 budget, the forecast for transport fee revenues was reduced by \$300,000 to account for this potential loss.

Other Highlights:

- Submitted reimbursement documents for the ambulance re-chassis (Local Program).
- o Billed all outstanding grants (Wildland, CARES, Child Safety Passenger).
- Received new Assessed Values for Port properties, prompting a review to update the ILA contract/Fire Control fee.
- Engaged the public at Fire Fest, providing direct answers on the District's finances.

New Apparatus Updates

- Fire Engines
 - o Budgeted for \$1,142,500 each for a total of \$2,285,000
 - In May of '24 the BOC approved the final cost of purchase not to exceed \$2,430,707.00
 - After the third attempt we have received a drawing that will meet all of our needs and we feel satisfied with.
 - Overall length increase of 4"
 - Keep current wheel base
 - Increase compartment space
 - Contract has been signed with True North Emergency Equipment for \$2,107,472.00 equaling \$1,053,736.00 per engine before taxes and delivery

- expenses. Price is not final and will fluctuate based off changes during build process.
- Pre-construction meeting was completed Aug 26th-29th and the members that flew back to participate included Chief Black, BC Fletcher, LT Kauzlarich, LT Morris, FF Kinney and FF Richter.
- Due to the recent availability of the current generation of motors for the engines we have signed another change order to go with the "L9" motor vs the "X10". The horsepower and torque outputs are near identical and the savings that will be received are \$80,257.00 per engine or overall savings of \$160,514. A change order was signed on 11/8/24 confirming the price reduction.
- The new work order stated there was still an 800 day expectancy to receive our engines however, the dealer is optimistic that it will be significantly less time.
- Engine committee has completed the needs list for the new apparatus to total approximately \$225,000. This amount has been added to the '25 budget for purchase.
- While Spartan was reviewing the specs it was discovered that not all of the equipment was added in for the new radio system and a \$1,208.00 change order was signed per engine to allow proper completion.

Ambulance 4x4

- o Budgeted for \$275,000
- A contract has been signed with Braun Northwest for the build of a 2025 North Star Ambulance through the HGAC buying Co-op for the purchase price of \$301,925.00.
- On 1/21 PM Wagner and myself went to Braun Northwest and conducted our prebuild meeting for the new ambulance. They advised us at the time that they currently have our ambulance slated to be completed in April of 2026.
- The final build specs were submitted to us for review and a change order was signed crediting us back \$7,550.00

Medium Duty Rescue

- Budgeted for \$250,000
- A new preliminary ballpark price provided by Braun Northwest puts the Rescue Build at \$245,000- \$255,000 before taxes
- The purchase of this vehicle has been postponed due to budgetary constraints

Ambulance Remount (EJ239)

- It was determined during budgetary conversations that we are going to rechassis one of our current ambulances.
- Remounting an ambulance means that we will be taking one of our old ambulances we currently own taking the box off of the current chassis and then putting it onto a new chassis. The box will also be receiving a makeover including new paint and replacing any parts that are worn or damaged. A remount of an ambulance saves a significant amount of money as compared to a new build and

also has a build time of only approximately 90 days after the chassis is received. This means that we should be expecting this to be completed by midyear of 2025.

- The ambulance to be remounted is EJ239 which is a 2010 E450 with approximately 200,000 miles on it. It is currently at station 5 and was moved out of the normal ambulance rotation several years ago due to its age and reliability.
- Bruan NW met with us several months ago to look over the ambulance and determine which pieces would be replaced and which pieces would remain the same.
- A proposal has been received from Braun Northwest for \$194,734.00 not including taxes. Additional costs have been added on an approved by the BOC in January's meeting to include radios, decaling, tax and any unforeseen costs incurred by Braun after tearing down the ambulance and assessing need for repairs. The total purchase price is approved at \$241,470. The proposal has been signed and returned which has started our build clock for the remount.
- New chassis agreement paperwork has been signed and submitted which will prompt Braun to order our new chassis.
- Pre-build meeting was conducted on May 21st with Fletcher, Wagner and Johnson to confirm the spec. The vehicle has been stripped of all unnecessary items and we are waiting for Braun to give us a date that they would like to receive the vehicle to begin construction.
- Our expected date to receive the vehicle back has been updated to October.
- EJ239 was delivered to Braun Northwest on 6/13 for them to begin the build process.
- The final specs were sent over for review and a change order was signed on 8/1 for an additional cost of \$1,550.00
- While tearing down and testing the oxygen system it was determined that it was leaking and that additional items would need to be replaced. An additional change order was signed for \$900.00
- Update- The vehicle was inspected by BC Fletcher and PM Wagner on 10/7 and returned to EJFR. The final purchase price from Braun NW was \$214,858.17. We are currently working on installing decals and cleaning up a few small items to put the vehicle in service which is expected to occur in late October early November.

C.A.R.E.S Vehicle (Final Report)

- The purchase of a 2024 Ford Maverick was made in July to replace the aging current vehicle with 200,000 miles on it.
- Lights have been ordered and have arrived, but we are currently still waiting on the arrival of radios so the upfitter can come in and install all of the components.
- We are attempting to standardize our logos that we use to avoid using something different on each and every new rig that arrives. With doing this we

are trying to standardize the font that is on the vehicles which has proven difficult to match what we currently have. It appears that it was not a standard font, and we are talking with design consultants to see what it would take to recreate the font that we have.

Update- The vehicle was placed in service on 9/22 and is officially completed.



Additional Awareness

- EJ034-2005 Ford F250 former investigation vehicle
 - This vehicle will be repurposed into the new utility vehicle at Station 2 replacing the former 1993 Dodge 2500(EJ710).
 - The snowplow equipment will be moved over to this vehicle off of Brush 2 (EJ395). This will occur after the wildland fire season to ensure that Brush 2 remains in service during that time.
 - The fuel tank from EJ710 will be also moved onto this vehicle.
 - The vehicle has been stripped down and the canopy has been removed placing this unit in service as a new utility truck at Station 2. The additional work on this vehicle will take place in late October as stated above.
 - Update- Vehicle is scheduled to have all of the plow equipment swapped over on the week of 10/13.
- EJ575- 1992 Simon Duplex Tender
 - This vehicle was purchase from Bainbridge Island Fire several years ago as a used apparatus to add to our tender fleet as a temporary fix until we were able to afford new tender.
 - It was a very custom built apparatus and there was only one other one built like it which NKFR bought at the same time that we did. They have since recently sold there's.
 - During a wildland response to Brinnon in July the tender overheated and NKFR
 was unable to assess the damage to the vehicle for several weeks due to other
 items that needed servicing. When the vehicle was finally assessed it is assumed
 that the motor has a crack in the cylinder liner and/or the valve head. Without

- tearing down the entire motor we are unable to fully diagnose the problems but because there is coolant coming out of the air box of the motor it is safe to assume it would require a full rebuild to be operable again.
- Calls have been made to several service centers in the area and each one of them said that they would not rebuild the motor due to its age, complexity of repairs and inability to acquire replacement parts. This leaves us with a tender that is inoperable.
- Conversations are being had with all the Chiefs to determine the next best course of action for a short-term and a long-term replacement solution.
- WSRB is being consulted as well to determine what our required need for tenders is to see if we can purchase something more basic without reducing our rating.

Engine and Tender Movement

- Due to the catastrophic failure of the tender as stated above some apparatus repositioning has occurred to best provide operational readiness.
- After several emails with WSRB it has been determined that we need a total of seven in service fire engines at any given time with one additional fire engine as a reserve.
- As an orginization we have identified that we should have a minimum number of four tenders in service at any given time.
- Station 8 has been operating out of a tender that is also qualified as an engine for at least a decade. The benefit of this is that they have a large water capacity however it only seats two members, it has limited compartment space, and it is significantly larger than a typical fire engine creating access issues. Another downside of having this tender at a staffed station is that typically when the vehicle is needed for water supply the crew is needed for firefighting activates which leaves the apparatus idle on a fire scene with no operator to be able to shuttle water with the vehicle.
- After conversations with all of the chiefs and members of the apparatus committee it was decided that it would be in the organizations best interest if we moved our current back up engine to become the new Engine 8 and that the current Engine 8 would become the new Tender 6. This would return our tender number to four.
- With this comes its own set of challenges meaning that we no longer have our typical back up engine to move into when an engine goes out of service. The solution that was created is that when a staffed engine has to go out of service for any reason the engine from Station 1 will be pulled from Station 1 and put in place of the out of service engine. When this occurs the crews from Station 1 would predominantly respond out of Ladder 1 because it has the capabilities to be a ladder and an engine.

- The exception to this would be that if Engine 8 goes out of service. When this
 occurs Station 8 would have to swap back into a tender because the engine from
 Station 1 will not fit in Station 8.
- The last challenge with this movement is that Station 1 regularly backs up Station 2 in their area which causes access problems for Ladder 1. The solution is that if Engine 1 gets moved out of Station 1 one of our reserve engines would move to Station 1 for this specific scenario.
- With all of this movement we still meet the WSRB requirements of seven in service engines and retain one reserve engine.
- The movement of apparatus was made on 9/27

Projects:

- **CAD upgrade** is underway after being delayed several months because Tyler would not schedule our desired annual spring upgrade. We are moving from version 2023.2 to version 2025.1, which includes a major and overdue upgrade of the GIS back end that provides address verification, mapping, quadrants, etc. The test side was upgraded last week, and the production site is scheduled to be updated November 3 (with a lengthy and total CAD outage required).
- **Fire Primary simulcast system** imbalance in audio levels was corrected by contracted technician last Tuesday. Technicians then completed annual preventative maintenance on all sites in the simulcast system and West End repeater with no major issues identified.
- Law Primary interference has been minimal lately with no progress toward tracking it down.
- IT continues to work on **extending our IP network to tower sites** over our microwave system and cellular/satellite backup. Capital funding is proposed in the 2026 draft budget to complete it, making it possible to deploy the proposed simulcast system refresh early in 2027.
- ESINet connections for 911 calls remain more vulnerable to fiber outages than
 our own connections, and the proposed tertiary use of Starlink is still pending.
 Our own network failed over to Starlink this week due to an extended earlymorning PUD maintenance outage, and IT has made some adjustments to
 network traffic that is allowed to use the Starlink connection to ensure that
 connection is more reliable when we fail over to it.
- Jeffcom and Pencom continue jointly investigating cloud-based call-handling and cloud-based CAD systems in hopes of replacing onsite equipment with a hosted solutions. We will need before the end of 2026 to determine whether we are going to replace expensive in-house call-handling equipment and CAD-hosting servers or will shift to cloud-based options for one or both. Agencies including users of CAD, LERMS and Corrections will need to participate in efforts to switch CAD systems.

Tower leasing: IT staff continue discussing our towers with additional tenants
where we have space for leased equipment, and we expect to lease space to
NOAA for a weather radio transmitter. NOAA's desire for a fixed long-term lease
is causing some issues to be resolved because of Jeffcom's lease from WA DNR is
not of similar terms.

- Strategic plan: Statewide E911 strategic plan will be reviewed and perhaps
 adopted at statewide conference in October and will provide a significant source
 of guidance for our own plan, particularly regarding future interagency
 technology deployment but also in areas of staff health and wellness and career
 development. An overview reviewed at the statewide meeting this month
 showed it to be well on track, addressing each of the areas listed above and
 nearing completion.
- Jeffcom and Pencom with the assistance of the medical program directors and EMS personnel from both counties have started the process of **updating emergency medical dispatching** guidebooks. We are jointly switching from a now unsupported guidebook from King County EMS to a fully supported program from APCO. Startup expenses include retraining all communications staff at both centers (\$100 per CO for classes taught at Pencom, \$300 for a center manager to oversee the program, \$1200 to certify instructors at Pencom) and printing customized guidecard books (\$2000). Benefits will include freshly updated guidance that matches field EMS protocols, refresher training on EMD for all communications staff and ongoing training and recertification through APCO. Future training for new COs will likely be done online through APCO classes that start every week and run for six weeks, a correction for the vexing issue we currently face of not being able to send new employees to training.

Budgetary Items:

- State equipment grant application period has opened, and we expect to apply
 for funding to replace CAD computers and monitors in 2026, to replace network
 switches and firewalls in 2026 and to replace our server cluster in 2027. Whether
 the server will be like-for-like or scaled down will depend on our decision
 regarding moving to a cloud-native CAD. The grant period covers the state's
 2025-27 biennium.
- Current staffing has dropped to nine full-time, fully trained communications staff including one supervisor, three part-time communications officers filling some shifts. Scheduling is returning to normal in October after being disrupted by administrative leave for the employee who is resigning, though we will no longer have a fully trained CO working the 1000-2000 shift for the back half of the week.
- **Recruiting**: Communications officer trainee that started July 13 continues to progress through training. A second applicant has will start next week on the

- opposite half of the week. These are communications positions ten and eleven. Position twelve will be filled only once others are through training.
- **CBA** negotiations will continue at least through October given the current schedule and assumptions regarding meetings and counter proposals.
- CAD maintenance credit statement has been provided by Tyler and largely aligns
 with our records. A portion of it will be transferred to the account of the City of
 Port Angeles to cover Jeffcom's third of shared-cost items for the core CAD
 system, for which Jeffcom is no longer invoiced directly by Tyler. The remainder
 will be applied to Jeffcom's pending 2025 invoices from Tyler. Discussion
 continues with Pencom about the extent of those shared-cost items.

Health, Safety and Quality of Life:

- August communications-staff overtime remained high at 308 hours among nine fulltime communications staff not on leave (July's was 352, June's 254, May's 210).
- **Found Therapy** Services continued sit-in appointments with all shifts, and we offered staff slots at EJFR's second of two scheduled days of private, off-site wellness appointments. Staff continues to show growing trust in that relationship and have started greater making use of Found Therapy resources.
- Office relocations are in process. We will work in stages to move the finance manager out of the EOC, then director, then records specialist, then publiceducation supplies, and finally making space for a second supervisor.

***** External Relationships:

- A **User Group** meeting was held September 9.
 - ◆ Jeffcom mentioned that telephonic interpretive services for officers on scene should not be billed to Jeffcom's grant funding for 911 interpretive services, so agencies need to redistribute to instructions on using their own accounts.
 - ◆ Debriefed progress on the shift to using their table app to update unit statuses and related issue with units from all districts clearing calls entirely and resultant confusion or Jeffcom having to reactivate calls.
 - Discussed upcoming debriefing of the recent use of the Navy helicopter for a medivac.
 - ◆ Discussed records entry by Jeffcom and what additional records work can be done by staff of LE agencies.
 - Discussed upcoming project by Jeffcom and Pencom to change APCO emergency medical dispatching guidance and an invitation/request for representatives of fire agencies in both counties to help.
- Draft amendment to the MOUs with Jefferson County and City of Port Townsend for law-enforcement records services was refined and sent to JCSO to go through the county's risk/legal review. Similar process with City of Port Townsend has not been started.

AFFILIATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON AND EAST JEFFERSON FIRE AND RESCUE

This Affiliation Agreement (the "Agreement"), effective as of September 26, 2025 is entered into by and between the University of Washington ("UW"), a state institution of higher education, on behalf of its School of Medicine ("the School") located at Seattle, Washington, and East Jefferson Fire and Rescue ("Fire Department"), located at Port Townsend, Washington. The School, Harborview Medical Center and UW Medical Center are among the component entities of UW Medicine, whose mission is to improve the health of the public by advancing medical knowledge, preparing the next generation of physicians, scientists and other healthcare professionals, and providing outstanding clinical care. The purpose of this Agreement is for UW to provide Paramedic Training (the "Paramedic Training Program") for Fire Department's designated employees ("Paramedic Students").

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS CONTAINED HEREIN, UW AND FIRE DEPARTMENT AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 1. UW and Fire Department agree that upon execution of this Agreement and within the scope of its provisions, UW may develop letter agreements with Fire Department to formalize operational details of the Paramedic Training Program for Fire Department's Paramedic Students. Letter agreements will be considered to be attachments to this Agreement and will be binding when signed by authorized representatives of each Party.
- 2. UW and Fire Department will instruct their respective faculty, staff, and Paramedic Students participating in the Paramedic Training Program to maintain confidentiality of Paramedic Student and patient information as required by law and by the policies and procedures of UW and Fire Department.
- 3. There will be no unlawful discrimination against any program participant or applicant covered under this Agreement because of race, color, religion, national origin, age, handicap, status as a Vietnam era or disabled veteran, sex, or sexual orientation, nor will UW or Fire Department engage in such discrimination in their employment or personnel policies.
- 4. Fire Department and UW acknowledge that the Medic One Foundation provides funding for Paramedic Students' tuition costs for the Paramedic Training Program. UW may charge nominal fees for incidental expenses per Paramedic Student/per Paramedic Training Program session, following discussion between the Parties.

FIRE DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBILITIES

5. Fire Department will designate an appropriately qualified person to coordinate and act as a liaison ("Liaison") with UW. Fire Department will notify UW in writing of any change in Liaison. Liaison will meet with the UW Educational Supervisor described in Paragraph 15 below at the beginning and

end of Program sessions to discuss and evaluate the Paramedic Training Program. These meetings will take place in person if practicable, otherwise by telephone conference.

- 6. Fire Department will provide the names for all Paramedic Students to be enrolled in the Paramedic Training Program at least six weeks before the beginning date of the relevant Program session. Fire Department is responsible for supplying any additional information required by UW prior to the arrival of Paramedic Students. Fire Department will immediately notify UW in writing of any change or proposed change in a Paramedic Student's status.
- 7. Fire Department will designate as Paramedic Students only those employees who have current Washington State EMT-B status (through June 30 of the following year), HIPAA training, and who meet all applicable UW entrance requirements.
- 8. Fire Department will ensure evaluation of Paramedic Students' immune status with regard to current CDC and OSHA standards for healthcare personnel, upon program entry and again each time standards are changed or updated. Fire Department will also ensure students receive initial and annual tuberculosis screening according to current CDC and OSHA guidelines. Fire Department will provide information to UW regarding Paramedic Student status concerning the above requirements prior to enrollment in the Paramedic Training Program.
- 9. Fire Department agrees to request a Child Adult Abuse Law and criminal background check (CAAL check) through the Washington State Patrol pursuant to RCW 43.43.830-.842. Fire Department agrees to provide UW with a copy of the check result pertaining to each Paramedic Student considered for placement at the UW. Fire Department acknowledges that placement of each Paramedic Student at the UW is contingent upon provision of information dated less than two years prior to the commencement of the Paramedic Training Program.
- 10. Fire Department will be responsible for each Paramedic Student's Worker's Compensation while on duty at UW and their health insurance coverage during participation in the Paramedic Training Program.
- 11. Fire Department will comply with and ensure to the extent possible that Paramedic Students comply with the policies and procedures established by UW. Fire Department will notify each Paramedic Student of their status and responsibilities pursuant to this Agreement.

UW RESPONSIBILITIES

- 12. UW will be responsible for planning, instruction, and administration of the Paramedic Training Program, and will provide Paramedic Students with a desirable Paramedic Training experience within the scope of this Agreement. The program is intended to allow Paramedic Students to meet the educational requirements for paramedic certification with the Washington Department of Health pursuant to RCW 18.71.205 and WAC Chapter 246-976.
- 13. UW will evaluate Paramedic Student progress as part of the Paramedic Training Program. UW will submit required reports on each Paramedic Student's performance to Fire Department on forms provided by Fire Department.
- 14. UW will have the final responsibility for grading Paramedic Students.

- 15. UW will designate one person as the Educational Supervisor, who will maintain contact with the Fire Department-designated Liaison to assure mutual participation in and review of the Paramedic Training Program and Paramedic Student progress. UW will notify Fire Department of any change in the Educational Supervisor.
- 16. The Paramedic Training Program will include as applicable, clinical educational experiences in UW Medicine healthcare facilities. UW will designate appropriately qualified Preceptors as applicable, to be responsible for supervision of Paramedic Students during the clinical educational experience portions of the Paramedic Training Program.
- 17. UW will provide Paramedic Students with access to sources of information necessary for the Paramedic Training Program, within UW policies and procedures and commensurate with patients' rights, including library resources and reference materials.
- 18. UW will make available to Paramedic Students basic supplies and equipment necessary for the Paramedic Training Program and related care of patients. Within the limitation of facilities, UW will make available office and conference space for Paramedic Students and as needed, the Fire Department School Liaison.
- 19. UW retains full responsibility for the care of its UW Medicine patients and for related billing and will maintain the quality of patient care without relying on the Paramedic Students' clinical training activities for staffing purposes.
- 20. UW has the right to take immediate temporary action to maintain its operation free from disruption and to ensure quality of patient care, including the right to terminate access to its UW Medicine healthcare facilities or participation in the Paramedic Training Program by a particular Paramedic Student. As soon as reasonable possible thereafter, the UW Educational Supervisor will notify Fire Department of the action taken. All final resolutions of the Paramedic Student's academic status in such situations will be made solely by UW, and all final resolutions of the Paramedic Student's employment status in such situations will be made solely by Fire Department.
- 21. On any day when a Paramedic Student is participating in the Paramedic Training Program at its facilities, UW will provide such Paramedic Student necessary emergency healthcare or first aid for accidents occurring in its facilities. The Paramedic Student will be responsible for the costs of all care. Except as provided in this agreement, UW will have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care to any Paramedic Student.

PARAMEDIC STUDENT STATUS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 22. Paramedic Students will have the status of learners and will not replace UW personnel. Any service rendered by Paramedic Students is incidental to the educational purpose of the Paramedic Training Program.
- 23. Paramedic Students will be and will remain Fire Department employees and will in no sense be considered UW employees. UW does not and will not assume any liability under any law relating to Worker's Compensation on account of any Fire Department Paramedic Student's performing, receiving training, or traveling pursuant to this Agreement. Paramedic Students will not be entitled to any

monetary or other remuneration for services performed by them at UW, nor will UW otherwise have any monetary obligation to Fire Department or its Paramedic Students by virtue of this Agreement.

- 24. Paramedic Students are required to adhere to applicable UW standards, policies, and regulations during their Paramedic Training Program at UW.
- 25. Paramedic Students will wear appropriate attire and nametags and will conform to the standards and practices established by UW during their Paramedic Training Program.
- 26. Students must make arrangements for their own transportation to and from all training activities. If students choose to carpool to training locations, they should be aware that the driver's personal auto insurance will be primarily responsible for any damage to property or bodily injury to other party or parties. If an accident occurs, the driver should contact the local police and complete an accident report.

LIABILITY COVERAGE PROVISIONS

- 27. Each Party to this Agreement will be responsible for the negligent acts or omissions of its own employees, officers, trainees, or agents in the performance of this Agreement. Neither Party will be considered the agent of the other and neither Party assumes any responsibility to the other Party for the consequences of any act or omission of any person, firm, or corporation not a Party to this Agreement, other than Paramedic Students as provided in Paragraph 29 within this liability coverage section.
- 28. UW will defend, indemnify, and hold Fire Department harmless from any loss, claim or damage arising from the negligent acts and omissions of UW's employees, officers, and agents connected with performing its obligations under this Agreement. UW maintains a professional liability coverage program under the authority of RCW 28B.20.250, .253, and .255. Through that authority, UW provides professional liability coverage for its employees, officers, and agents in the performance of this Agreement. Paramedic Students are not agents of UW.
- 29. Fire Department will defend, indemnify, and hold UW harmless from any loss, claim or damage arising from the negligent acts and omissions of Fire Department's employees, officers, Students and agents, including the independent negligence of Paramedic Students. Fire Department will maintain professional liability coverage with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 annual aggregate (or an equivalent program of self-insurance).
- 30. Upon request, both Parties will provide proof of coverage. UW and Fire Department will notify the other in the case of material modification or cancellation of coverage, and to provide subsequent proof of coverage thereafter.

PROVISIONS REGARDING BLOOD-BORNE PATHOGENS

31. Fire Department certifies that it has trained each Paramedic Student it sends to UW in universal precautions and transmission of blood-borne pathogens and that it will send to UW only Paramedic Students who have been trained in and have practiced using universal precautions. Fire Department has provided the opportunity to receive Hepatitis B (HBV) vaccine pursuant to RCW Ch. 70.24 to all Paramedic Students before enrollment in the Paramedic Training Program. As applicable, UW will

provide or facilitate provision of personal protection equipment that is appropriate for the tasks assigned to Paramedic Students during the Paramedic Training Program.

- 32. If a Paramedic Student sustains a needle-stick injury or other substantial exposure to bodily fluids or other potentially infectious material while participating in the Paramedic Training Program onsite at UW, UW agrees to provide the following services:
- 32.1. Being seen by UW's employee health service and/or relevant UW Medicine healthcare facility emergency department as soon as possible after the injury for emergency medical care;
 - 32.2. Initiation of HBV, Hepatitis C (HCV) and HIV protocol;
 - 32.3. HIV counseling and appropriate testing.

The Paramedic Student will be responsible for the costs of any such care, testing, and counseling. UW will determine the source patient's HBV, HCV, and HIV status according to its customary policies and procedures.

TERM AND TERMINATION

- 33. This Agreement is effective September 26, 2025, and will continue thereafter from year to year. This Agreement will be reviewed by the Parties no later than three years from its effective date, or earlier at the request of either Party. UW and Fire Department will jointly plan Paramedic Student placement in advance of each program year's beginning.
- 34. This Agreement may be terminated by sixty (60) days' written notice; however, such termination shall not become effective for Paramedic Students then enrolled in the Paramedic Training Program if such termination prevents completion of their Paramedic Training Program.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 35. <u>HIPAA</u>. UW has designated its healthcare components and the entities comprising UW Medicine as one Affiliated Covered Entity under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA"). Fire Department will direct students to comply with relevant UW Medicine policies and procedures. Solely for the purpose of defining the Paramedic Students' role in relation to the use and disclosure of UW protected health information, Paramedic Students are defined as members of the UW workforce, as that term is defined by 45 CFR 160.103, when engaged in clinical training activities at UW healthcare facilities pursuant to this Agreement. However, Paramedic Students are not and shall not be considered UW employees.
- 36. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties, and supersedes all prior oral or written agreements, commitments, or understandings concerning the matters provided for herein.
- 37. <u>Amendment</u>. This Agreement may be modified only by a subsequent written amendment executed by the Parties.

- 38. <u>Order of Precedence</u>. Any conflict or inconsistency in this Agreement and its attachments will be resolved by giving the documents precedence in the following order:
 - 38.1. This Agreement;
 - 38.2. Attachments to this Agreement in reverse chronological order.
- 39. <u>Governing Law</u>. The Parties' rights or obligations under this Agreement will be construed in accordance with, and any claim or dispute relating thereto will be governed by, the laws of the State of Washington.
- 40. <u>Notices</u>. All notices, demands, requests, or other communications required to be given or sent by Fire Department or UW, will be in writing and will be mailed by first-class mail, postage prepaid, or transmitted by hand delivery, electronic mail or facsimile, addressed as follows:

Each Party may designate a change of address by notice in writing. All notices, demands, requests, or communications that are not hand-delivered will be deemed received three days after deposit in the U.S. mail, postage prepaid; or upon confirmation of successful facsimile or email transmission.

- 41. <u>Survival</u>. Fire Department and UW expressly intend and agree that the liability coverage provisions of this Agreement will survive the termination of this Agreement for any reason.
- 42. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement, or of any other agreement, document, or writing pursuant to or in connection with this Agreement, is held to be wholly or partially invalid or unenforceable under applicable law, that provision will be ineffective to that extent only, without affecting in any way the remaining parts or provisions of this Agreement or such other agreement, document, or writing.
- 43. <u>Waiver</u>. Neither the waiver by any of the Parties hereto of a breach of or a default under any of the provisions of this Agreement, nor the failure of either of the Parties, on one or more occasions, to enforce any of the provisions of this Agreement or to exercise any right or privilege hereunder, will thereafter be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach or default of a similar nature, or as a waiver of any of such provisions, rights or privileges hereunder.
